#### **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!!!**



### Critique by Penny Kritt

We get a change of pace this month, thanks to Eric Goss. Eric has asked for a discussion of his drawings, and I've chosen two. Since there will be no commentary of the use of color, the relative size of shapes, the amount of contrast between them and the transition from one to another simplifies what we have to consider.




*Hat*Charcoal and conté

The range of values from light to dark is the single most powerful tool an artist has. How he chooses to move from one value/shape to the next is a critical design decision. A hard edge between a light shape and a dark one creates a contrast that will cause the viewer to spend more time there than at a place where there is a smaller, gradual or softer transition between value shapes.


Let's look at what Eric has done. He worked from a set up in his studio. He chose a canvas hat on a plain background. Both are mid-toned in value, even though he used a bright directional light to create a few lighter shapes and dark shadows for contrast. I added the black and white shapes for those who did not realize that the drawing didn't have any "dark darks" or "light lights." Eric departed from what he actually saw by putting the dark line around the hat, especially around the brim on the right side. Had he not taken that artistic license, the viewer wouldn't be able to tell where the hat stopped and the background started.

Now we'll use the magic of Photoshop to increase the contrast with a greater range of values, from the highlight on the top and on the brim of the hat to a truly dark shadow behind the hat. The more the contrast in your artwork, the longer the viewer will linger to enjoy it.



The angle of the lighting created large plain shapes both above and below the hat. Compared to the finely rendered attention to detail in the hat, the shadow and large background shapes are boring. One quick glance and the viewer knows all there is to know about those shapes. The hat itself, however, has many interesting lines from the stitching and value contrasts from the highlights and shadows on the material. Note that the greater contrast makes the hat look slightly shiny, as those it was made of a polished cotton material instead of canyas.

Now let's change some shapes to see if we can get the viewer to spend even more time in the composition.



By moving the light source (or pretending we did so), we have an excuse to change the big dark shape on the left edge. The original shape made a big "V" that just pushed the viewer right to the hat. By changing the shadow to a more organic, irregular shape, the viewer slows down to follow the edges and gets to the hat at a more leisurely pace.

The chin strap in the original made two strong lines that dragged the viewer right out of the drawing. By changing them to a loop, the viewer circles away from and then back to the hat to enjoy it again.

Now let's switch gears and look at an architectural subject.



Hallway Charcoal and conté By Eric Goss


Eric has done a masterful job of giving the viewer a sense of foreboding when looking down this long, dark hallway. The walls are dark and perhaps dirty. The shine on the wood floor is inconsistent, so it seems shabby as well. His use of the molding to create a vanishing point in the center of the composition tells us that this is a very long walk.

But since Eric sent this for a critique, maybe that very sense of being a seedy, rundown hallway is what might need to be changed.



First, let's just add some light to the whole composition. That will take away the sense of gloom. Then, just for fun, let's crop the right side so the drawing is no longer symmetrical. It still gives the viewer something of an unsettled feeling, but it isn't so foreboding.

Since Eric hasn't made us do much to correct this detailed drawing, let's just nitpick a little.



There are two small changes that need to be made in the doorway because now it looks both crooked and warped. First, the blue line points to the flat bottom of the door where it should be slanted upward in the same direction as the rest of the molding. The pink lines point to the slightly widening shadow of the edge of the door. That also gives a sense of being warped, and if the door was not ajar, we wouldn't see that shadow anyway.

The moodiness of this composition comes from the sense that winter might eventually give way to spring. The sun is lighter in this version to better explain why there are no cast shadows. If we think of the trees at the right as one complex shape instead of individual units, we can simplify them. In the original, the tops of the trees on the right formed a diagonal that led the viewer out of the painting. By making that a larger and more interesting complex shape, it now forms a backstop to keep the viewer in the painting.
