Tips from Penny Kritt How a Painting Evolved

There's no perfect way to get an idea in your head to a finished product. As a matter of fact, in *my* case, there are a lot of great ideas that never even make it beyond my sketchbook. You may be impatient to just start painting, but I enjoy the planning process because it greatly increases the odds of getting something that's worth framing.

There are many ways to work out different issues. Here's a look at how one painting evolved.

I like hand tools. They are usually very practical in both function and design. Some are also sculptural works of art, so they should make a great painting, right? I did a few simple sketches (*Figure 1*) to determine what shapes I liked best and how to use them in the picture space.



Most of their shapes were simple. In the top sketch, I played with the straight versus sensuous curves of calipers (the calipers are the two shapes that look like an "A" in parentheses) compared to more angular measuring tools. The middle sketch contrasted angular tools with the curves of a hand drill. In both of these, the tools were just static, unconnected shapes. The bottom sketch also played

the curves of the tool handles against the straighter body of each tool, but the tool rack provided a connection between the shapes. But in all of these versions, I felt that the viewer could tell at a glance that the painting was about tools and that would end his interest.

It was time to try something else, so I did a few sketches (*Figure 2* below) that had someone using the tools.



In the first sketches, the tools were usually in a vertical orientation. Diagonal compositions are often more exciting, or at least, more interesting. Now the challenge was to implement this new design strategy.

The diagonal arm shapes worked well, so it was time for more sketches (*Figure 3* below).

Notice that the compositions above only show part of the person. This was a design choice to help reinforce that the center of interest was the tools. The human element was simply a device to introduce diagonal shapes. That led to a test of how much or how little of the man should take up of the total picture space (see *Figure 4* below).



In the left version above, the gadget got overwhelmed by the more interesting diagonals of the man's arms and it was also in a less prominent position. The version on the right simplified things and made the gadget more important. Making the figure larger solved most of those pesky issues about creating a background. But in the end, now the painting was about the man, not the tool.




Working Together (22 x 30 in.) Gouache on Paper By Penny Kritt

In the final version above, I took the metal shapes of the screw driver, wheel hub and spokes and used them as directional elements to send the viewer around the entire composition. Then I added the human elements that would cause the viewer to pause and consider my choices. It is apparent that a man is holding the screw driver but a woman is holding the tire. We can tell that she is married, but since we're looking the man's right hand, it isn't clear if they are married to each other. He's also a different race that also exaggerates the difference between the figures.

The image above may be too small to see details, but here are several important elements.

In *Figure 5* below, I added continuity to the design by repeating colors around the painting. If I only used a color in one place, especially a strong color like the red of the nail polish, it would be literally cause the viewer to ignore the rest of the painting. When that happens, newbies take out the offending color. More experienced artists know to add more of it around the composition.

The gold of the wedding ring shows up both in the handle of the screw driver and in various reflections in the metal spokes and bicycle chain. The red of the nail polish is reflected in the metal as well as on the product tag on the tire.



One last challenge was that this new plan needs a background. Something simple was the answer, but did I have to explain what it was? In one test, behind the radiating spokes, you could see a shirt with a big numbered tag that racers wear. One version was clearly a woman in a tank top, another was obviously a man. But in the spirit of "less is more", I just chose a simple, unifying color. Even that took two tries. The green background in *Figure 6* below didn't work. There was too much

yellow, so it minimized the contrast – and hence the importance – of the skin tones.

To recap, here's *my* process. Start with an object or concept that has an interesting design element. If the shapes work well, the result will probably be a still life. But even then, the final product will almost always be better if there's an indication of a person (or animal!) having some interaction with the other elements. And you'll always get more points if you *make the viewer wonder about what's going on*!

You can show your artwork in Glenview Mansion for one month if you have received a 1st, 2nd, 3rd or honorable mention award in an RAL juried show. Artists may have both rooms to exhibit in if a second artist doesn't sign up for the same month within two months of the show's start date. The receptions at Glenview mansion are 1:30-3:30 PM on the Sunday after hanging. Preferred drop off and pick up times for Glenview Shows are from 9 am to 12 noon. Drop off/pickups are Mondays (unless a holiday). If you are unavailable on the date for pickup, please arrange for someone to pick up for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion. If you are unable to drop off/pick up on the assigned dates and you can't find someone else to drop off/pick up for you, please choose a month in which you can make those dates.

For artwork delivery, please unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). You may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion to move your artwork from your vehicle. There is no staff at the mansion available to help you move your artwork into the conference rooms. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork, with help from the Mansion staff. If you don't have labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available. If you print your own, print them on card stock.
