
Critique by Penny Kritt

Where to Start Your Art

As an art teacher, I have many adult students who show up in class and, first thing, they apologize for not having the time to have painted something since the last class. Usually there is sadness in their voices, occasionally shame and always wistfulness. To all of you readers who recognize yourselves in that statement – STOP IT! Art should give you joy, not guilt. For your own sake and sanity, get rid of all those negative thoughts. Besides, you probably have furthered your artist career during the week even though you never touched your art materials. Did you think about whether you wanted to paint a landscape or a still life? Maybe you tried to figure out how to build the perfect color for a sky filled with thunderclouds. *Planning* the what, the why and the how are all essential parts of creating a satisfying finished image.

For this column, I'll be thinking about a composition that has trees in it. Maybe the trees will be part of the background. Here are some preliminary ideas I did quickly on my ipad. As you look at each image, take a moment to identify what is different from one to the other. Which do you like best? And why is that so?





Some people assume that you can't begin to paint until you have fully drawn out a composition. Most of them are very analytical: the accountants, the scientists or anyone who prefers precision to a less stringent path to completing a project. For them, it just doesn't make sense to start anywhere else. Doing so would be like missing the first 45 minutes of a movie, so why bother? For them, but not necessarily for others, having a precise plan should be their first artistic step.

For others, all they need is a few little sketches like those above that show where the largest and most important shapes are. That general road map provides enough guidance without being too restrictive.

Maybe you just love color, so any painting class will make you happy. Mixing the exact color you had in mind can be an exhilarating achievement. Just as a clothing designer decides between making a jacket out of leather, silk or denim, that first choice will determine whether the garment will be worn on a motorcycle, to a formal party or when running errands. Everything else is based upon that selection. You'll make up the rest as you go along. The journey is what is important, not whether you ended up with the best composition of your life. What you learned to do, what you found that you liked, what backfired on you – those are all important tools that you can use to get to that best composition of your life.

When painting skies, many of you always go to French Ultramarine Blue, like the swatch on the left below. It's a great color for skies that are fairly far north of the equator. For the look of the Caribbean, try using manganese blue, like the swatch on the right.

Without looking back at the images above, which sky color was used? Did you include thinking about that level of detail?





Some people want to start with the tools of art. They choose what brush(es) to use and spend hours experimenting on how many ways they can use them. Paper versus canvas is even more critical than subject matter. The subject may determine whether the resulting work will be done with oils, acrylics or watercolors. For advanced artists, the medium is further narrowed down to transparent or opaque media. If you create collages, whatever materials tweak your imagination might be the most important part of a particular composition.

When you work as a realist and people know the objects you depict, how realistic do you want to be?

With the tree images above, they were clearly just filling up space in the background. Crudely formed, there was just enough info that you could tell they were generic trees. But what if there was one tree that was different, *special*?





By putting a large tree that overlaps the smaller ones to its left, now there's a sense of vast distance between them. Then there is that broken branch, a sign of the tree's endurance through hard times. Now we have a *portrait* of a specific tree. With the image on the right, the main tree took up even more of the image space and so I had far less background to deal with.

As you go about your daily life, little bits of this column will come back to you. Portrait or landscape orientation? How much background is really necessary to explain your story? And in those moments of contemplation you do important work to advance your artistic talents.


MEMBER NEWS

GLENVIEW MANSION CONFERENCE ROOM SHOWS

You can show your artwork in Glenview Mansion for one month if you have received a 1st, 2nd, 3rd or honorable mention award in an RAL juried show. Artists may have both rooms to exhibit in if a second artist doesn't sign up for the same month within two months of the show's start date. The receptions at Glenview mansion are 1:30-3:30 PM on the Sunday after hanging. Preferred drop off and pick up times for Glenview Shows are from 9 am to 12 noon. Drop off/pickups are Mondays (unless a holiday). If you are unavailable on the date for pickup, please arrange for someone to pick up for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion. If you are unable to drop off/pick up on the assigned dates and you can't find someone else to drop off/pick up for you, please choose a month in which you can make those dates.

For artwork delivery, please unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). You may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion to move your artwork from your vehicle. There is no staff at the mansion available to help you move your artwork into the conference rooms. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork, with help from the Mansion staff. If you don't have labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available. If you print your own, print them on card stock. Do not use the sticky Avery labels, unless you adhere them to foam core or card stock.
