"There is nothing more difficult for a truly creative painter than to paint a rose, because before he can do so he has to first forget all the roses that were ever painted."

"Creativity takes courage."

Matisse was courageous, he took risks to be unique and he was often criticized for not painting like other artists. He was the original "fauve" artist (wild beast artist) and wasn't afraid to paint a green stripe down the middle of his wife's portrait.

And eventually his genius was recognized and collectors not only went to exhibitions showing his work but also supported him financially through purchases and commissions.

I much admire Matisse and the world is a better place because of his belief in himself, his art and his vision.



And I admire the artists in our art league and your willingness to put your work on display

and be true to yourselves and, as a result, make our world a little more beautiful. Some extra beauty is very much welcome especially these days.

October 4th, 2018: Fran Abrams "How to get your artwork into exhibitions"

Fran Abrams, a resident of Rockville, MD, holds an undergraduate degree in art and architecture and a graduate degree in urban planning. She will present on the process for having your artwork accepted into exhibitions.

In January 2000, after making a New Year's resolution to return to her roots as an artist, she

began studying and creating with polymer clay. She retired from her day job in July 2010 after 41 years of public service in government and nonprofit agencies in Montgomery County, MD. She then helped to establish the Betty Mae Kramer Gallery and Music Room in the Civic Center in downtown Silver Spring, MD, serving as manager from 2010-2012.



Fran's work is shown regularly at Foundry Gallery (www.foundrygallery.org), a nonprofit, artist-run gallery in Washington, DC. In addition, her work, in competition with more traditional mediums, has been juried into many exhibits in the greater DC metropolitan area and other parts of the country. She also has had work juried into national exhibits of polymer clay art in Lexington, MA in 2010 and in St. Paul, MN in 2013. In May 2014, her piece titled, "Warmth of the Fire," won Best in 2D Art in the International Polymer Clay Awards competition that included entries from around the world. That piece is now in the collection of the Racine Art Museum in Racine, WI.

Digital Art

Even if you've already started using a digital device to create art, you probably have questions about how you can use digital tools.

If we loosely define "art" as the combination of lines, shapes and colors, you can even create some interesting images on very old versions of Microsoft Word. For example, how wide a line you choose, what shapes you select, and the colors you make them already give you an unlimited set of tools to work with. Add that you can overlap and/or group them, move and resize those groups, invert any or all of them and it can keep you busy for hours on end.

Newer technology like tablets lets you set up a studio virtually (yes, that's a pun) anywhere. For the purpose of this column, we'll talk about an app called Procreate that's available for about \$10 for Apple devices. The range of things you can do with it in some ways exceeds Photoshop. The real stumbling block is that with a \$10 app, you don't get a lot of help explaining what it does, let alone how to use the functions.

This issue is true with most art materials. For example, you can spend hundreds of dollars on the perfect sable brush, but it doesn't come with a manual that shows you how to make different kinds of brush strokes or how to care for it. So what's an artist to do? Generically, find the answers to the following questions. What does this app or product do? How do I get it to do those things? Where will they be useful? Why will it be useful in that location? Try YouTube for tutorials.

I'm not here to recommend any app, but I can give you the best place to start, and that's with understanding making and using digital brushes. All art apps use brushes, and the terminology and functions are similar. One common element from Photoshop to Procreate is that they have brushes that you can modify in a variety of ways. Here's some ideas on how to make and/or modify a brush.

Here's a brief overview of the main elements to try with the art app you use.

Brush size: Like the physical brushes we use, digital ones can be different sizes (widths). You can preset a digital brush to be wide or narrow, and with some apps on a touch screen, increasing the pressure of your finger or stylus will widen the line. Lessen the pressure and the line gets narrower.



Figure 1 above shows a variety of brush strokes that are easy to make. They all use exactly the same color. Line No. 1 acts like a narrow round (pointed like a pencil) brush with soft, blurred edges that would be useful in doing shadows or trees in the background. No. 2 is a larger version of the same brush but it has less opacity/more transparency. It's like watercolor paint with lots of water, or oils and acrylics with lots of medium added. The purpose of this is to tint, rather than cover up what is below. You can see it more clearly at the bottom where the black under-color has been removed.

Line 3 is the same size, but with *total opacity and hard edges*. It's the kind of stroke that is often used to build a strong center of interest in a design. Line 4 is like a flat/chisel brush -- the little mark to the right shows you what you would see if you just lightly dabbed the brush one time on paper. Notice that the beginning and ending of the brush stroke is different than on Line 3, especially when the brush stroke changes direction – without you changing the position of your hand. It's great for calligraphy.

You can also modify images without using brushes at all. A newer function is the ability to divide an image into sections that replicate any move in one area to all the others. That lets you create symmetrical patterns like Figure 2 below with amazing speed and accuracy. In effect, the image below was divided into 6 equal wedges radiating out from a central point. Anything done in any wedge was automatically duplicated in the others.

Then this single image could be imported into a larger document and repeated to make a pattern. In Figure 3 below, I've just copied the square above 3 more times.



These apps also let you distort images in a variety of ways – and you can *usually* undo that distortion!

Figure 4 above was a digital design I did for a scarf. I liked the colors, but the shapes were boring. The "liquefy" command created Figure 5 below.

GLENVIEW MANSION CONFERENCE ROOM SHOWS

You can show your artwork in Glenview Mansion for one month if you have received a 1st, 2nd, 3rd or honorable mention award in an RAL juried show. Artists may have both rooms to exhibit in if a second artist doesn't sign up for the same month within two months of the show's start date. The receptions at Glenview mansion are 1:30-3:30 PM on the Sunday after hanging. Preferred drop off and pick up times for Glenview Shows are from 9 am to 12 noon. Drop off/pickups are Mondays (unless a holiday). If you are unavailable on the date for pickup, please arrange for someone to pick up for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion. If you are unable to drop off/pick up on the assigned dates and you can't find someone else to drop off/pick up for you, please choose a month in which you can make those dates.

For artwork delivery, please unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). You may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion to move your artwork from your vehicle. There is no staff at the mansion available to help you move your artwork into the conference rooms. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork, with help from the Mansion staff. If you don't have labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available. If you print your own, print them on card stock. Do not use the sticky Avery labels, unless you adhere them to foam core or card stock.
