Message from the President, Patrick Sieg

Dear Rockville Art League Artists,

There is a stunningly beautiful art show on display.

It is the Rockville Art League Juried Members' Exhibit and yes, it is back at the Glenview Mansion Art Gallery. Of course, the show is beautiful primarily because of you. Specifically, our artist members' willingness to take a risk and to enter a juried show coupled with the highly accomplished nature of our art. And there were three additional things that really made a difference for this exhibit:

- 1. Using an electronic process, including images, greatly improved the processes of:
 - a. Entering the show (including the verification of membership status and finalizing new members in advance versus at drop off)
 - b. Dropping off work and "crowd" logistics...it was much faster and more convenient this time and much "greener"
 - c. Labeling work

- 2. Judge Gavin Glakas' hard work deciding which pieces would look best together in our show and then the selection of the award winners. Gavin took great care and genuinely invested many more hours than we had any right to expect in that work. And it was hard to make these choices.
- 3. The curating of the show. Lisa Sieg deserves heartfelt thanks for all the hours she has devoted to making this a lovely show.
 - a. I know how grateful she is for the many members that took their time to volunteer and help in all aspects of supporting this show.
 - b. Her artistry in putting art together in each of the rooms was amazing and breathetaking...wow.

I cannot wait for you and your family and friends to see our show and more details are included later in this newsletter. Please invite them to the gallery to experience our show.

Our 2018/2019 RAL year had promised to be a difficult year. We needed to find new venues for our meetings and galleries for shows due to the closing of the mansion and we needed new

processes and thinking to be successful. Change is hard.

Here are some things that I learned this year...

- We have interesting, talented and joyful members and with that great combination of attributes, change can be fun.
 - I worried about the loss of the mansion for our meetings and now, in hindsight, I know that there was no need to worry. Our attendance this year was higher than at any time in the past four years (and perhaps longer).
 - The space at Artists and Makers 2 had the benefit of access via a lovely gallery, a model platform and a demonstration mirror.
 - Our speakers were just terrific.
- Had we not lost the use of the mansion for none months we would not have found the Priddy Library as a show venue (and we plan/hope to be back there in 2020) or have secured an outside show in Artists and Makers 2 this coming September.
- Artists, at least our group, are willing to try new things and are resilient to change. We embraced new entry processes, met in new places and many of us experimented with our art. I appreciated Gavin Glakas' comment in his show statement concerning solving intriguing problems in unique ways. That is true for art and true for life.

We have more RAL art shows coming up this summer and fall.

- September: we are in the Main and Merge Galleries at Artists and Makers 2.
- Mid October: we are exhibiting at Brookside Gardens.

Both of these outside shows are great opportunities to exhibit your work and make connections. We have board member positions available for members who would like to be more involved in decisions affecting our league. Specifically:

• Outside show coordinator

• Publicity and social media outreach We need your ideas and enthusiasm.

We are selecting speakers for our meetings. Fortunately, we will have Dr. Irina Stotland back in September to share her knowledge about an important artist and the culture and history that influenced their art. Dr. Stotland has graciously spoken to our group in September for the last two years and we are continuing that tradition...and many of you have asked that she return.

Photographic artist Michael Koren, one of our most popular speakers, will be offering a "hands-on" workshop on the smartphone at the National Gallery of Art. The workshop will be offered in November at a 50% discount for members. Stay tuned for details.

Thank you all for supporting the Rockville Art League and for making us an even stronger organization during times of change (ongoing). Please take the time to thank our board members for the time and effort that invest in RAL. Their help on the board is appreciated and your thanks go a long way.

Please look for mailings over the summer with reminders about our outside shows and things RAL.



Gavin Glakas' Judge's Statement

I want to thank the Rockville Art League for inviting me to judge their 2019 Spring Juried Art Show. I have really enjoyed seeing so much excellent artwork and I am looking forward to meeting so many talented and enthusiastic artists.

When I judge a show, I'm basically looking for two elements: idea and execution. I want to see work done with a high level of talent that is depicting visual or psychological ideas that I find interesting and challenging. I want to see an artist set up a difficult or intriguing problem and then try to solve it in a unique way.

Sometimes I am drawn to work that looks like it was a stretch for the artist - an ambitious reach for something that is almost just beyond their grasp. Other times, I respond to the seeming ease and masterful handling of something simple and concise. Sometimes the idea is better, sometimes the execution is better, and every once in a while, when lightning strikes, creativity and execution exist in a perfect harmony of excellence.

I try to remain impartial and to judge pieces strictly based on their artistic merits, but at times the sheer enjoyment I get out of a piece supersedes any other criteria.

One last note - I'm not inclined to reward paintings that are simply copies of photographs. Photos can be a very helpful resource for a 21st Century artist and regardless of the reference, we can all tell when an artist is taking chances, making creative decisions, intuitive changes, abstractions, and trying to create something that communicates an idea they have.

We can also tell when someone slavishly copies a photo they took without any creativity. The uniformly sharp edges, the overabundance of unnecessary detail, the lack of interesting color harmonies, the uniformity of treatment without regard to composition or 3-dimensional space these are all reasons why work might not resonate with me as a judge or just as someone who loves art. If you find yourself inclined in this direction, start taking some chances. It gets way more fun!

And finally, I am just one person with one opinion. If your piece didn't make it into this show, keep working so it wins an award in the next one.

<u>Call for Entries:</u> July 1 – August 1, A *JotForm* will be sent out to members at the end of June. *Online submissions only*: <u>deadline Thursday</u>, <u>August 1</u>

We are excited that Judith HeartSong, the director of Artists & Makers 1 & 2, will host the Rockville Art League for our September Members' Show. This is a great way to start the new season by showing the community your work. As the gallery accommodates approximately 60 pieces, we are limiting entries as 1 per member. (Note: if you were a member in good standing for 2018-2019 you may enter this September show.)

<u>**Call Deadline:**</u> You will be asked to submit work *online only*.

A *JotForm* will be emailed out at the end of June to all RAL members on the mailing list. Members may submit work beginning **Monday**, **July 1 – Thursday, August 2**. You will be informed if your piece is in the show by Friday, August 9.

Entry Fee: A \$5 show fee will be collected when accepted work is dropped off.

Eligibility and Rules: Each member may enter **one piece** by submitting an *online JotForm* sent out at the end of June. The form will ask for your name, title of piece, medium, price, dimensions, contact info, and an image of the piece you are submitting. If possible, please rename your image (jpg or jpeg) with the title of the work you are submitting, prior to uploading it.

- The maximum measurement of any framed side is **36 inches**.
- Only original works <u>framed securely</u> <u>with hanging wire</u> are acceptable. No sawtooth hangers, etc.
- If submitting unframed canvas, edges should be painted or finished appropriately.
- No giclées or reproductions. NO wet canvases allowed.
- The entries <u>may not have been</u> <u>exhibited</u> previously in a RAL Member Show.
- All artists should clearly mark their name and title on the reverse of their piece.

RAL retains the right to determine the suitability of the work for entry in this show.

Original artwork includes:

- Oils and acrylics
- Watercolors
- Pastels, drawings and hand-pulled prints
- Mixed media, collage, experimental and original computer-generated art
- Photography
- Sculpture and ceramics

<u>Sales:</u> You will be asked to sign a show agreement from Artists & Makers Studios. By signing this agreement, you acknowledge their 25% of the sales price of any work sold during the show.

Delivery and registration: Tuesday, Sept. 3: 11:30am – 1pm and 5-6:30pm The Merge and Main Galleries are located at Artist & Makers 2 /12276 Wilkins Ave. Park in back of building and the galleries are on the same level as the parking lot.

<u>Reception:</u> *Friday, September 6, 6-9:00,* invite your friends and family!

Final pick-up: Thursday, September 26, 11:30-1pm and 5-6:30pm

We will need volunteers to help check in work, hang and label and help with the opening reception.

Nature lovers, please mark your calendars for this beautiful show!

RAL Members *in good standing* are eligible to submit original work for this show which means you must **renew** your membership for 2019-2020.

<u>Call for entries:</u> online submissions will be open Friday, September 13 – Friday, September 27. A 2-week period only for submissions for this show and a JotForm will be available in the September newsletter and emailed out to members. You will be informed by Friday, October 4 if your work was accepted into this show.

Theme: Nature! Submit your wonderful landscapes, seascapes, vegetation, flowers, floral arrangements, botanicals, etc., for this exhibition.

Due to space limitations members may submit one piece of original framed work only. The work <u>must be framed securely with hanging</u> <u>wire</u>. No sawtooth hangers. NO wet canvases. Maximum measurement of any side of framed work is 36 inches.

Original works (2-D only) include:

- Oils and acrylics
- Watercolors
- Pastels, drawings, hand-pulled prints
- Mixed Media, collage, experimental and original computer-generated art
- Photography

Bin work: will be accepted and there will be a place on the JotForm specifically for this information. Unframed giclée prints (yes! they're accepted as bin work) or original artwork no larger than 16 x 20 inches will be accepted for the bin work. All bin work must have a backing and be enclosed in a clear plastic bag. (Brookside gardens will allow the RAL a maximum of 30 pieces for our entire group.)

Sales: All sales will be handled by the Brookside Gardens Gift Shop. Brookside Gardens will collect and pay to the State of MD a 6% sales tax on all sales. Shortly after the end of the exhibit Brookside Gardens will send the artist a check for any artwork sold during the exhibit less a 25% commission. <u>Commissions:</u> artists will be asked to sign a show agreement that Brookside Gardens will receive a 25% commission on any sales made during the exhibit or for a 6-month period after the exhibit.

Members will be asked to bring *the show agreement* as well as a *\$5 show fee* at drop off.

Delivery and registration: Monday, October 14. Hours TBD **Pick-up:** Monday, Nov. 11 and possibly Sunday, Nov. 10. Hours TBD

Critique by Penny Kritt

Abstracts – Part 1

You rarely find someone who has no opinion – pro or con – when it comes to abstract art. It's sort of all or nothing between realism and anything else. Until a few years ago, I would have clearly said "NO" to the general category. But occasionally, I found a piece that was fabulous. Eventually, I decided to quantify what and why I did – or didn't – like abstracts.

Let's start with a vastly oversimplified description of this genre. Below (Fig. 1) is simple pattern, a uniform repeat of black dots spread across a medium gray field. Here's as basic as it gets: when you look at it, its significance isn't obvious.




Or is it? Scan your eyes over it and you can tell at a glance that it's a regular polka dot pattern. The dots are lined up equidistant from each other, but the rows and columns are off center. Made you look, didn't I! Why did the artist choose that location? But except for that slight off-center quality, it is a calm and predictable image.

Here is the *magic* part – when the viewer stops dead in his tracks to figure out *why* (or *how*) something was done. Let's look a few more variations on this theme. In Fig. 2 below, there is a little white square that fits neatly into a dot. That gives it a little more interest. Who is this white square and why has he chosen *this* dot to squat on?



With Fig. 3 above, that white square has moved to a new location but he isn't carefully enclosed within the dot. Who is this messy intruder? So even though Fig. 2 got you used to a white square without much ado, now there's a bit of anarchy going on. *Is this to be tolerated?*

If Fig. 3 above what slightly upsetting to the regular order of things, OMG, what's going on with Fig. 4 below?!?!?!?!?



One dot is missing entirely, another is cut off but not in half. Then there's the complete mess in the lower right. Holey smokes, Rocky*, WHAT IS GOING ON?

The images above were a demonstration of how much emotional content you can still pack into an abstract composition. And that's before any colors are introduced. How would things change if the dots were warm colors on a cool background? Or if every dot was a different color? The possibilities are endless.

For all of you realists out there who would never even think of creating an abstract, what's this got to do with you? The answer is plenty!

As you arrange your still life that has candlesticks in it, should all of them be alike: the same height, the same metal, the same design? Maybe keep the tall silver one, but add a smaller crystal one so you have an excuse to add any color that you need to sprinkle around the composition for unity. Compare Figs. 5 and 6 below. Here's an old painting done decades ago. I wanted to show off painting textures. Hence the silver, the mahogany wood, the crystal vase, all hard and angular objects. The composition was softened by the curvilinear flowers. My goal was to paint a warm and comforting scene in a traditional setting.

Which one is more interesting? Why?

As with the abstracts above, by adding – or minimizing -- contrasts, various items came into view or seemed to disappear. Adding the bronze candlestick added a shape to balance the left side of the scene without repeating the colder silver of the original candlestick. Then transparent quinacridone rose was added, on the flowers in the vase and in the reflections on the crystal and in the silver candlestick.

Now the balance of shapes is different without having to rework the entire painting. In the upper version, all the flowers have equal importance. In the lower one, the rose color brings you eye to spend more time on the flowers in the vase, but the lighter use of it on the silver candlestick help you move elsewhere.

With both realistic and abstract work, the artist makes complex decisions to present to the viewer. Most important is to convey emotion – serenity, outrage, curiosity, etc. That sets the tone and narrows choices on color, placement, use of pattern or texture.


